Dear Parent/ Carer,

I hope that this edition of our newsletter will give you a flavour of how Haywood Academy and City College has continued to deliver the very best experiences for our students, despite the obvious challenges that have faced all academies up and down the country. We have certainly seen significant disruption to many of our students' education through positive cases and large scale isolation of students; we have even seen the need to implement a year group circuit break and, in July, a whole academy circuit break! I know that this was the last thing that any of us wanted, but it was a necessary step under the guidance at that point to keep our community safe. I would like to thank you all for your support during these times.

I really do hope that we can now begin to move on, enjoy the Summer break and look forward to a far more positive start in September.

Our year 11 and 13 students will, of course, be moving on to pastures new, beginning their next chapter of education. We all enjoyed celebrating with our leavers at their respective leavers' events last month and wish them all the very best for their new adventures.

As we wish our leavers well, we do of course, welcome our new year 7 students to the Haywood Academy community. I am really looking forward to seeing you at our Summer School in August and for your start with us in September. You will very quickly realise how special your new community is and how exciting your journey with the academy and City College will be; you have a fantastic 7 years ahead of you!

What now follows are details of our future LFD testing programme and the changes to educational settings for the new academic year and how your child will be affected. Please read these details carefully and contact the academy if you have any questions.

SUMMARY OF STEP 4 CHANGES TO EDUCATIONAL SETTINGS

The following changes announced by the government will come into effect at Haywood Academy and City College from 1 September 2021.

Hand hygiene - students will continue to clean their hands regularly with soap and water or hand sanitiser.

'Bubbles' – it will no longer be necessary to keep children in consistent groups ('bubbles'). Managing those with symptoms and positive cases – students should not come into the academy if they have symptoms. If they develop symptoms whilst in school they should be sent home. Those displaying symptoms should book a PCR test and self-isolate until they receive the result. In the event of a positive PCR result, the individual will be required to continue to self-isolate. Contact tracing – close contacts will be identified via NHS Test and Trace and schools will no longer be expected to undertake contact tracing. Close contacts from a school setting will only be traced by NHS Test and Trace where the positive case specifically identifies the individual as being a close contact.

Self-isolation – from 16th August 2021, adults who have been 'double-jabbed' and children under the age of 18 years old will no longer be required to self-isolate if they are contacted by NHS Test and Trace. Instead, children and adults in the academy will be informed they have been in close contact with a positive case and advised to take a PCR test.

Face coverings – students will no longer be required to wear face coverings in classrooms or in communal areas, or whilst travelling to/from school on public transport. In the event of a local outbreak, face coverings may be reinstated.

Ventilation – classrooms will remain well-ventilated, comfortable environments.

LFD testing – students will be requested to take two LFD tests in the academy's on-site test centre prior to and during their return in September. In addition, they will take twice-weekly LFD tests at home until the end of September 2021.

Positive LFD test results – students with a positive LFD test result should self-isolate and book a confirmatory PCR test. If the PCR test result is negative, the individual can return to the academy.

Risk assessment / contingency plans – schools will continue to be required to have a full risk assessment in place for the new academic year and a contingency plan for managing a Covid-19 outbreak in the academy or the local community.

Remote education – schools will continue to be required to provide remote education for those students who are not able to attend for Covid-19 related reasons (typically self isolation). This will continue through our use of Google Classroom.

COVID-19 TESTING ON RETURN TO SCHOOL

As mentioned above, students will be asked to complete two LFD tests in school on their return in September. It is necessary for tests to be administered between three and five days apart and we are currently planning for testing to take place on-site as follows:

In light of the changes set out above, we have reviewed our existing procedures and made plans for the new academic year. These plans are set out in the table at the end of this address. Whilst students will no longer be taught within year group 'bubbles', some of the arrangements introduced this year will be retained as they have contributed to a calmer school environment and resolved some issues we face when managing large numbers of students during breaks with only limited communal spaces. In particular, designated entrances, exits and break time zones will be retained.

YEAR 8 SELECT FRESH ART

Over the last term a group of 24 Year 8 students have been involved in an intensive work experience opportunity with the British Ceramics Biennial. The British Ceramics Biennial is a festival of contemporary ceramics that takes place in Stoke-on-Trent, and Haywood was offered the opportunity for a group of students to work alongside the team and form a youth panel to help select the exhibitors for the 'Fresh' part of the upcoming exhibition.

To do this, the students received intensive training around forming and expressing opinions, as well as understanding criteria and the shortlisting process. This year the 'Fresh' exhibition had over 200 applicants! The students spent a day reading and rating the applications, deciding on individual and group preferences, and the final stage was for the group in teams to join a live Zoom call with the professional panel, made up of representatives from across the ceramics sector, including representatives from Staffordshire and Cardiff University, and Wedgwood.

They joined this process of discussing and analysing the different work to narrow down the selection to 25 who will be given the opportunity to exhibit in 'Fresh' as part of the Biennial this September.

Taking part in this opportunity gave the students a real insight into professional arts practice and also the wider creative sector. In addition, there has also been a real opportunity for them to play their part and influence what would have previously been an adults only process.

UNIFORM GUIDELINES

As the end of the academic year approaches, I am sure many of you will be looking to restock academy uniform items. Before any of you embark on this over the holiday period, please could I take this opportunity to remind you of some of the key parts of the uniform policy.

The intention of this is to avoid unnecessary confrontations at the start of the new term with students returning to the academy not dressed in accordance with our uniform policy.

School shoes: Plain black sensible leather shoes (no logo), maximum 3cm inner edge of heel, no boots, no canvas shoes, no trainer style shoes. Please see photos on our website to help you in your purchase.

School shoes can be particularly expensive, and we have had issues with parents spending a lot of money on footwear which clearly does not take note of the above information. We would very much like to avoid this as it puts the academy at odds with the student which is not what any of us would wish for and is a negative start for all concerned.

Jewellery: Of any description is not encouraged and is not practical for many reasons. All jewellery must be removed for PE activities and is brought into school entirely at the student's own risk.

Nose studs and all other types of piercing are NOT allowed. Earrings should be of a plain gold/silver stud design and only be one per ear. Rings/Bracelets etc are NOT permitted.

If you do decide to allow your child to have additional piercings please ensure that they are **completely removed** before leaving home. This will be strictly enforced and students not correctly attired for lessons will not be allowed to attend lessons until the issue has been fully resolved. Again, I should stress that this is absolutely the last thing we want as an academy as we all place great emphasis on good attendance to school and to lessons.

Students will be required to remove any items of jewellery which contravenes this code; they will be confiscated and given to the Main Office until parents collect them from the academy.

Make Up: Subtle make-up is acceptable – this is natural foundation and includes clear nail varnish and a subtle coat of mascara. Nail varnish is not allowed. False nails are not allowed.

Outdoor coats and Hoodies: Please note these are NOT permitted at all during the school day. If your child travels to school wearing an outdoor coat or hooded top then they must remove these and place in their school bag for the remainder of the working day **before** entering the academy building.

MYEd App



We are changing the way that we communicate with parents, and relaunching the My Ed app.

We would like all parents to download this so that they can keep up to date with what is going on in school. The app is free to download, notifications are free to receive, and parents can send messages to the school free of charge.

What sort of information can parents see?

The app needs to be downloaded on the phone that has the same number that we have on

If we do not have the mobile number stored you can download the app but it will not show your child's details.

It is very important that we are kept up-to-date with any change of mobile number so that you can continue to use the app.

You can only see information about your own children, and so there is no risk of anyone being able to see information about other students.

The app includes information about:

- Attendance (absence can also be reported through the app)
- Forms to complete can be downloaded (change of address etc.)
- Key dates- important things going on in school
- Contact numbers
- News items
- · Links to social media

How to download the app:

- 1. Go to your app store
- 2. Search for My Ed
- 3. Download the app
- 4. Search for the school name

As long as the mobile number is the same as the one on SIMS then the app will automatically bring up details for students linked to that number. If there is more than one child in the family then it will bring up details for all students.

Students can download the app too but they will not be able to see information about them. They will be able to see general information about the school such as news, key dates etc.

Just follow the on-screen instructions and you will be sent an email to activate your account. Once you have created an account and activated it, you will be able to complete the online questionnaire quite quickly and easily.

TO SEARCH FOR A SCHOOL:

Enter the name of the school and part of the address (road, city, town or postcode) in the search boxes when you are asked to. Select your child's school from the search results

THE QUESTIONNAIRE:

There will be 12 statements to consider- for example, "My child is happy at this school"each with a choice of responses for you to

- Strongly agree Agree Disagree
- Strongly disagree Don't know

Use the "Next" button to move to the next question or the "Previous" button to go back. Once you have completed all 12 questions, click on "Finish the survey" and the questionnaire is complete.

COOKING UP A TREAT ON ELS

As part of the Employability & Life Skills (ELS) course, our students carry out a home cooking skills element, and they have been coming up with some amazing food!

Over this half term, students have had a barbeque, produced a Mexican-inspired banquet, and made other things including cakes, scones, soup, ice cream, a variety of pasta dishes, and hand-battered fish with homemade chips!

Our unique ELS course is suitable for students who are not certain of what vocational area to move into, who may need more support with English and Maths, and who need to develop social skills, want to improve confidence, and like to work in a small group environment.

- Access outstanding pastoral care
- Have independent careers advice
- Have support from members of the Learning Support Team
