Dear parent/ carer,

I hope that this Summer edition of our newsletter gives you a flavour of the wonderful year that we have had at Haywood Academy and City College since we re-opened our doors for the first full academic year following the dreaded lockdowns of 2020 and 2021. What a year it has been! As you will see throughout this newsletter, we have witnessed the return of many much loved academy experiences and opportunities that have previously been taken for granted; experiences our students absolutely deserve. Uniform Policy

As an academy, we are proud of our student identity and insist on the very highest standards in uniform and appearance, but we are also an academy acutely aware of our community, collective needs and at one of the most difficult periods of time for many, we are here for our students and their families. Don't forget, we are buying every student one complete uniform bundle that will include all of the branded items necessary to adhere to our uniform policy.

Just head to Smart Uniform; they have opened a new unit at: Unit 2, Brownhills Road, Tunstall, ST6 4JZ. Details of the uniform for 2022/2023 are included in this newsletter for your reference.

Structure of the day:

Another change that we are making in support of our academy community during such unprecedented times is to the structure of the academy day. So

that our Form Tutors see all of their students at the start of each day, before academic learning begins, everyone will be involved in form time. This will allow our pastoral teams to ensure that everyone is set up for learning and is raring to go from period 1 onwards. Form Tutors will be making sure that their students are well equipped, meet our very high uniform standards and are fuelled with breakfast ready to go! To enable this and to ensure that we are building towards the government's expectations for September 2023, our new daily structure from September 2022 when we return from the Summer holidays will be as follows:



Enter the name of the school and part of the address (road, city, town or postcode) in the search boxes when you are asked to. Select your child's school from the search results.

THE QUESTIONNAIRE:

There will be 12 statements to consider- for example, "My child is happy at this school"- each with a choice of responses for you to select from:

- Strongly agree
- Agree
- Disagree
- Strongly disagree
- Don't know

Use the "Next" button to move to the next question or the "Previous" button to go back. Once you have completed all 12 questions, click on "Finish the survey" and the questionnaire is complete.

We are changing the way that we communicate with parents, and relaunching the My Ed app.

We would like all parents to download this so that they can keep up to date with what is going on in school. The app is free to download, notifications are free to receive, and parents can send messages to the school free of charge.

What sort of information can parents see?

The app needs to be downloaded on the phone that has the same number that we have on record.

If we do not have the mobile number stored you can download the app but it will not show your child's details.

It is very important that we are kept up-to-date with any change of mobile number so that you can continue to use the app.

You can only see information about your own children, and so there is no risk of anyone being able to see information about other students.

The app includes information about:

- Attendance (absence can also be reported through the app)
- Forms to complete can be downloaded (change of address etc.)
- Key dates- important things going on in school
- Contact numbers
- News items
- Links to social media

How to download the app:

1. Go to your app store
2. Search for My Ed
3. Download the app
4. Search for the school name

As long as the mobile number is the same as the one on SIMS then the app will automatically bring up details for students linked to that number. If there is more than one child in the family then it will bring up details for all students.

Students can download the app too but they will not be able to see information about them. They will be able to see general information about the school such as news, key dates etc.

UNIFORM CHANGES

We are conscious that, as September looms, the cost of new school uniform is a strain for many parents and this, coupled with the rising cost of living was something that we wanted to consider carefully for our community.

Parent feedback has indicated that you would welcome changes, so long as the uniform itself remained a smart representation of the Academy and that students could wear with pride. You asked us to consider cost carefully, as many of you have to buy uniform for a number of children. You also asked us to consider the quality and where you could buy items from. The final point you made was around whether or not all items had to be branded in the way that they are now (e.g. trousers and skirt) for the uniform to remain smart.

Taking this as our guide, we have gone on to consult with our student body about the type and style of uniform that they would like to wear and then with school uniform suppliers to test the quality and cost point.

- KS3 students (Years 7, 8 and 9) will wear a new branded navy jumper, school tie, white shirt, smart tailored black trousers and black leather (or leather look) shoes. In addition, branded PE top and plain navy shorts.
- KS4 students (Years 10 and 11) will wear a branded jacket, school tie, white shirt, smart tailored black trousers and black leather (or leather look) shoes. In addition, branded PE top and plain navy shorts.

We are an academy who are proud of our student identity and insist on the very highest standards in uniform and appearance, but we are also an academy acutely aware of our community, collective needs and at one of the most difficult periods of time for many, we are here for our students and their families. As such, we will be buying every student one complete uniform bundle that will include all of the branded items necessary to adhere to our uniform policy. To ensure that the rest of the uniform is as affordable as possible, we have moved to black trousers (rather than our traditional navy) as they are readily available from all local super markets and clothes stores.

Our stockist has changed too. Our uniform will only be available from Smart Uniform from now on. They have a new unit opened at: Unit 2, Brownhills Road, Tunstall, ST6 4JZ as well as their other local stores. In addition, you can order your uniform bundle from them online (smartuniform.co.uk) and either have it delivered to the school free of charge for you to collect from here or to your home address for a small fee.





Subject staff were on hand to have conversations with parents about support available, and information was shared with students about the specific support on offer such as revision guides and extra sessions. Students also had the opportunity to collect their exam results, and these will be posted home to any parents who were unfortunately unable to make the evening.



BUILDING POSSIBILITIES

On Monday 20th June 11 of our Year 10 students went on an educational Careers visit to Tunstall Town Hall to learn about the construction industry.

GF Tomlinson, a Derby based company, have undertaken the prestigious restoration of the building, and the students had the chance to see how the project had been managed and the completed results.

HANDS-ON LEARNING

On the 1st July our Geography department took a group of 85 Year 10 students to Talacre Beach in North Wales, where they got to experience first-hand what doing GCSE fieldwork is like.

They looked at what impact humans have had on the fragile sand dune environment, and used a range of fieldwork equipment such a quadrant to gain primary data from the area.

This will be used to answer questions on their paper 3 exam next year!

STAY SAFE ONLINE



Follow these top tips when online:



Choose a good password and keep this secret. The best passwords have a combination of letters, numbers, and other characters. Avoid using your name, birthday, or birth year.



When you are online or using apps check your privacy settings to see if your information is **public or private**.



Stop and think if someone online asks for your full name, address, phone number, school or a photograph. **Don't share these details with anyone online.**



If a message makes you feel uncomfortable you don't have to reply.


Always tell a parent or guardian if you are worried about anything you see online or on your phone.



Do not say anything or publish pictures that might later cause you or someone else embarrassment. Be aware of what friends post about you, or reply to your posts, particularly about your personal details and activities.



You can't always believe what you see online, some of the information can actually be fake – this can include fake facts, images, videos and even people. If you haven't met someone in real life before you chat online be very careful as they may not be who they say.



OUTDOOR FIRE SAFETY

Respect the outdoors and remember these points when you are out with your friends this summer:



Take your rubbish home or put it in a nearby bin.

Don't leave glass bottles lying on the ground. Sunlight shining through glass can start a fire.



Call 999 if you see a fire - don't try and tackle it yourself and leave the area as soon as possible.



Don't use disposable barbecues in the countryside - they can easily set fire to the ground and spread.

DON'T BE BLAMED FOR THE FLAMES



Be Water Safety Aware

When the weather is warm the water can seem so inviting, but it is a risk that is simply not worth taking. Swimming in rivers, canals and lakes is dangerous. Remember these points when out and about this summer:



Only swim in properly supervised pools, the **dangers of water** include: **very cold temperatures, hidden currents, fast flowing water, deep water, locks and weirs, pollution, hidden rubbish and debris**. It may also be difficult to get out and there will not be lifeguards present.



If you see another person or a pet in trouble in the water do not enter the water yourself. Raise the alarm or if you have a mobile phone call 999 and ask for the fire service. Try and give an exact location of where you are and look for and signs or landmarks. If there is a lifebuoy or throwline nearby throw it to them. If not, throw anything to them that will float.



If you fall into water by accident try to fight your instinct to thrash about, instead lean back and float on your back while you catch your breath. Once you are calm call for help or swim for safety if you are able.

Off-road bikes and e-scooters are illegal to use in any public space such as pavements, roads and green spaces. They can only be used on private land with the permission of the land owner.


LET'S GET READING!

FUTURE STARS




We hope that next years' Year 7s had a fabulous time during their transition days on 6th and 7th July – we enjoyed welcoming everyone!


On 7th June, City College played host to the first, sold-out meeting of the Potteries Lunar Society.
