The day consisted of visiting some of the over 400 memorials, visiting the exhibition 'Lockdown landscapes', and walking the vast grounds of the arboretum, where all of the trees planted are dedicated to the memory of someone who has been lost.

We were also lucky enough to hear a talk about the life of Harry Farr, a conscientious objector who is studied as part of History lessons at Haywood, and see the plaque commemorating him as part of the 'Shot at Dawn' memorial.

Our students demonstrated our ARCH values of **Respect** and **Community**, and were a credit to the Academy.







## Reading Rocks!

We now have a renewed focus on weaving reading into the curriculum, and this is taking a number of forms, including reading on the board as a class, reading individual paper texts, reading digitally on individual screens, guided teacher reading, silent reading, and teachers drawing out key words from texts to check for understanding.

# Welcome To Haywood!

This term, Haywood has been welcoming Year 6 pupils from our local primary schools for a wide range of fun activities and events, helping to start the transition to high school for many young people in our community.

The excitement began with the launch on 21st September of The **Haywood Way**, a 6-week programme taking place each Thursday evening, including sports, cookery, art, design, and ukulele playing,





which culminated in a Haywood X Factor! This proved to be so popular that we decided to repeat the experience for Year 5 students!

We then welcomed Year 6 and their families to our Haywood open evening on 28th September, followed on 7th October by our weekend open morning, where we were joined by alpacas from **Hassall Alpacas**, an inflatable assault course, and a range of birds, reptiles and insects from **Wings and Things**.

We have also had Year 6 students in on 20th October to get a taster of life at Haywood Academy, and they had an amazing time completing a range of sessions!

We can't wait to welcome Year 6 back again in the new year!























## **Ceramic City**

Before the summer, a group of Year 8 students (then Year 7) had the opportunity to work with the team from the British Ceramics Biennial to try and explain different pieces of artwork for their Biennial Exhibition, which took place this autumn. Students then visited to see their contributions to the exhibition interpretation panels, experience the whole exhibition, and got their hands dirty!

Using clay from the construction site of Old Oak Common, the new HS2 railway station in west London, they made their very own heritageinspired tiles, to which they added wildflower seeds. Each clay tile will remain un-fired and will be laid together at Staffordshire University, where they will provide a rich bed for wildflowers to grow on, creating an urban meadow in the city, and creating something beautiful out of disregarded materials and overlooked elements of nature.

From this experience, our students learned how exhibitions like this are organised, some of the behind-the-scenes roles, and what really goes into something of this scale. They also got to learn more about different artwork and artists.

In 1842 there was a worker protest in Burslem, led by a group called the Chartists, demanding the right for all men to be able to vote. Unfortunately, they were met by Dragoon guards who opened fire on the crowd, and a 19-year-old shoe maker from Leek called Josiah Heapy was shot dead. Several others were wounded and later died of their injuries. A total of 218 men and women from North Staffordshire were put on trial, and 146 of these were given sentences from 10 days to 2 years, with another 54 being transported to Australia.


Before the summer, the People's History of North Staffordshire (PHANS) created a competition for local schools to create posters



and banners that could have been used during the demonstrations, along with diary accounts and other information, to commemorate the victims of the 1842 potteries riots.

Our students worked really hard during breaks, dinner times and at home to produce the poster, and we were able to submit three brilliant banners and a diary account of Josiah Heapy.

We're pleased to say that Haywood was one of the three schools that had won the competition, which included £100 prize money to spend on the History department, and on 23rd October Year 7 had a special assembly from PHANS to celebrate and to learn more about this important event in our local history.

Haywood Academy is part of the City Learning Trust, and we are pleased to say that at the Education Today School & Supplier Awards 2023 on the 8th December, the CLT won the Outstanding Multi-Academy Trust of the Year award!

# **SUPER**

To support the Year 9 Science curriculum topic about renewable energy, a group of students visited the Keele Sustainability Park at the end of October, where they saw and learnt about how solar panels and wind turbines were able to power more than half of Keele village.

They also learnt how the production of electricity through sustainable and renewable energy sources can support the National Grid by both reducing the amount of electricity needed and by selling electricity back to the National Grid to support with supply and demand.



### **WORKING WITH WEDGWOOD**

A group of Year 9 students have since September been working with a team from V&A Wedgwood to organise their Upstart careers festival, and the theme this year was wellbeing. The experience started with an opportunity to visit the V&A collection and the Wedgwood factory in Barlaston, and they then had the opportunity to work with local artist Alice Thatcher and students from the University of Derby to develop a range of activities, which they refined through a series of visits and opportunities.

This culminated in the group of students running a day full of activities at Wedgwood for different student from across Staffordshire, and they did an amazing job running sessions that were experienced by everyone!





The team from the museum were so impressed they all received a medal for taking part. Miss Morgan said it was great to see the students talk about how this project has developed their confidence and abilities to talk to and work with people they do not know, and how they value the range of creative options they have ahead of them for GCSE.
